

From the Pastor's Desk

We are about to enter the season of Lent which takes us to the heart of our Christian faith, and I have been thinking about the end of the journey for God quite a bit lately. The eastern Christian churches have made Jesus' death and resurrection the center of their celebrations and the biggest and most important



celebration of the year, whereas the western Christian churches have in general made Christmas their most important day and put the most effort into Christmas Eve celebrations. The whole story matters and the death and resurrection changes everything for us as people God has made, loved, and given up so much to redeem, to bring home to God.

I have been thinking about the last days of Jesus' life through the influence of Jürgen Moltmann as he flips the question from what does the cross mean for us as sinners, to what does the cross mean for God? For me, the heart of the story begins in Gethsemane when Jesus is praying for another way forward and begins to sweat blood as he is grieving. I believe this is the beginning of Jesus experiencing the abandonment of God the Father and Spirit; the start of him knowing what it means to be forsaken by God for the first time in his existence. That forsakenness takes him through his trials, his beatings, and his death on the cross where he cries out to God the Father and dies. In his death, Jesus suffers the forsakenness of God the Father.

In Jesus' death, God the Father loses his son. Both Jesus and the Father experience the death of God in two different ways. Maybe this is what is meant by sickness unto death and lostness that takes us to the place of nothingness? Jesus is now experiencing the dark night of the soul while the Father is experiencing in the forsakenness of the son, a world eclipsed of God as the son is no longer present in the world. As our creeds teach, Jesus is now in hell which means that a part of God, the Son is in hell and the Father is still in the heavens above and the Spirit has yet to be given as a gift to Gods' faithful.

God the Father, through the Spirit, raises Jesus the Son up from hell, back to life in a resurrected body as the first fruits of the resurrection and reconciling work of God. The pain and suffering, the forsakenness, the death is all now a part of God as is Jesus' humanness. He is resurrected in his human body and still eats with his disciples.

I wonder what it means for God that the Father now knows death in one way and the Son now knows death in another way and the spirit knows death through the father and the son. This makes sense of why the apostle Paul can say in 1 Cor. 6:20, "For you were bought with a price [meaning it cost God a lot to forgive our sin]; therefore, glorify God in your body [your whole self here and now]." God is about life and hell has no power over God (we might even ask how Jesus has changed hell?); the resurrection changed everything for us and for God.

Faith in Jesus sets us free from sin and death. Living in Christ's freedom has something to do with glorifying God, with living in Joy, with living hope, with loving God and others for their sake and not ours. The Lenten journey is about knowing where we come from and where God is taking us through our faith in Jesus. Our giving up during the season of lent is a way of glorifying God for what God has given up for us. It is not just a practice but more a humble act of appreciation and dwelling in what God has done for us out of love. Let us journey into lent together.

Thank you to all who contributed to Souper Bowl Sunday! Your generosity is much appreciated by the two food pantries we donate to, and our community families that they serve.



From Our Parish Nurse

National Consumer Protection Week takes place March 2-8, 2025. It is a time to help people understand their consumer rights and avoid fraud and scams. Here are some common signs of a scam and some helpful tips to avoid them.

Four Signs That It's A Scam

- 1. Scammers PRETEND to be from an organization you know- They often claim to be contacting you on behalf of the government (Medicare, IRS, Social Security) or pretend to be business like a utility company, tech company or even a charity. They can use technology to change the phone number that appears on your caller ID, so the name and number may not be real.
- 2. Scammers say there's a PROBLEM or a PRIZE- They might say you owe money to the government, someone in your family had an emergency, that there's a virus on your computer, or that there is a problem with one of your accounts. Others lie and say you won money in a lottery or sweepstakes, but you have to pay a fee to get it.
- 3. Scammers PRESSURE you to act immediately- They want you to act before you have time to think. They will pressure you not to hang up so you can't check their story. They might threaten to arrest you, sue you, take away your license, or say your computer is about to be corrupted.
- 4. Scammers tell you to PAY in a specific way- They often insist you can only pay using cryptocurrency, wiring money through a company like Western Union, using a payment app, or putting money on a gift card and then giving them the numbers on the back of the card. Some will send you a check (that will later turn up to be fake), then tell you to deposit it and send them money.

How To Avoid A Scam

- 1. Block unwanted calls and text messages
- 2. Don't give your personal or financial information in response to a request that you didn't expect- Honest organizations won't call, email, or text to ask for your personal information, like your Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers. If you get an email or text message from a company you do business with and you think it's real, it's still best not to clink on any links. Instead, contact them using a website you know is trustworthy or look up their phone number. Don't call a number they gave you or the number from your caller ID.
- 3. Resist the pressure to act immediately- Honest businesses will give you time to make a decision. Anyone who pressures you to pay or give them your personal information is a scammer.
- 4. Know how scammers tell you to pay- Never pay someone who insists you can only pay with cryptocurrency, a wire transfer, a payment app, or a gift card, and never deposit a check and send money back to someone.
- 5. Stop and talk to someone you trust- Before you do anything else, tell someone you trust what happened. Talking about it could help you realize it's a scam.
