Ripon LEGO Team #1665 Competitions



OSUCC is home to Ripon's LEGO Multiverse Team #1665. The team is 10 students in grades 4-8, coached by Sara & Dave Heyn, Julia & Mike Manor, Naomi Magadanz. Dave Schoff is the Lead for Ripon. Sara is Head Coach.

Their first competition was November 2023 at the Wisconsin First Lego League Regional tournament in Janesville. Twenty-nine teams from all over Wisconsin competed for a spot in the Sectionals, with hopes of making it on to the State competition.

This year's theme required teams to highlight the role that science, math,

technology, and engineering play in the arts. The teams were judged on their written presentation and also how their LEGO robot was designed and programmed to complete a set series of tasks. The team does all the work.

The Ripon team won at Regionals and moved forward to Sectionals on December 16th. Their head coach said, "They competed very well and showed the judges all that they had learned this year. We are super proud of all they accomplished." Unfortunately, the team did not advance on to State this year, but keep an eye on them for 2024!

From the Pastor's Desk

Happy New Year and a Blessed Epiphany. I want to share a story of something I observed before Christmas. I was with a group of rotary exchange students, inbound (foreign students living in the US for a year) and outbound (US students who will be traveling overseas to live for a year). We were on a scavenger hunt in downtown Chicago and this year each group of students needed a couple of adults along as chaperones. The reason we were needed was because the tension in the downtown was a bit high due to the streets being filled with twenty-one thousand political refugees from Venezuela and bus loads arriving each day with more refugees because Chicago is a sanctuary city. So, as we walked down Michigan Avenue there were families with small children sitting against the buildings out of the way with everything that they owned in front of them begging for any help they could get.

It was difficult to see so many woman and small children sitting there with all they had, unable to speak any English. They were either kicked out of their home country because they believed in democracy and free elections or because the current dictator collapsed the economy by eighty percent and everything they had owned was lost or taken from them. The city of Chicago was trying to find housing and jobs for all these people whose dreams were shattered at someone else's hands. Here they are now in a foreign country, not where they really wanted to be, with nothing but the clothes on their backs and without the ability to speak the dominant language.

What amazed me was watching the different high schoolers from our group of exchange students take money from their own wallets or purses and walk over to give it to some of the families in need as we were explored downtown Chicago. Both our students and our foreign students were helping some of the people in need as we passed by. No one told them to do this or expected them to do this. As one said to me, "I'm blessed, I can help." Their generosity to these strangers was so awesome to see.

After our scavenger hunt we regrouped at one of Chicago's most famous pizza places, where we were treated to course after course of food. We were all sitting at tables for six and were given enough food at each table for twelve people. After we had finished, some of the adults and some of the students saw how much food was left. They began taking to-go boxes big enough for one or two large pieces of pizza and filling them, using up most of the leftover, untouched pizza pies. They then took all the to-go boxes back to Michigan Avenue and, as we walked along, began passing out boxes of still warm pizza slices to all the people they could who were sitting up against the walls of buildings waiting till the homeless shelters opened back up.

It is so easy to make our world small and miss all the things going on around us. Sometimes we need to simply because our world is so complex. It was awesome to be a part of a group of people who, without thinking or being told to, simply found ways to show a small token of generosity. We don't know if their gift of food and a bit of cash made a big difference but, in some cases, the pizza may have been enough to keep someone alive one more day and give them a chance at another one with more hope.

The season of epiphany is about Jesus showing us how to open our world with small acts that can touch and change people's lives through God's power in us. Let us together ask God to continue transforming us this Epiphany season as we live our faith each day.


