# From Our Parish Nurse

Did you know Kidney disease is often referred to as a "silent disease" because there are usually no symptoms during its early stages? As many as 90% of Americans who have chronic kidney disease don't know they have it until it is very advanced.



Did you know Kidney disease is often referred to as a "silent disease" because there are usually no symptoms during its early stages? As many as 90% of Americans who have chronic kidney disease don't know they have it until it is very advanced.

The good news is your doctor can perform 2 quick tests to check for kidney disease and provide guidance on how to make changes to keep your kidneys healthier for longer.

The tests include a urine test to check for kidney damage and a blood test to see how well your kidneys are working. If your kidneys show signs of damage your doctor may refer you to a specialist, called a nephrologist, or recommend more frequent testing.

Even if you feel healthy, if you are over 60 or have risk factors such as diabetes, high blood pressure, or heart disease it is important to discuss with your doctor getting tested for kidney disease.

Some important steps you can take to protect your kidneys from damage include:

- Quit smoking
- · Take your medications as prescribed
- Monitor OTC medications for NSAIDs(ex. Ibuprofen or Naproxen) as these can cause kidney damage
- Control your blood sugar if you are a diabetic
- · Control your blood pressure
- · Meet with a dietician to develop a meal plan
- Make physical activity part of your routine
- · Aim for a healthy weight
- · Get enough sleep
- · Find healthy ways to cope with stress and depression

Protecting your kidneys may allow you to work, spend time with family and friends, stay active, and do other things you enjoy for longer.

## Thank You, Thank You so Very Much!


Missions Committee would like to thank everyone who participated in the Souper Bowl Sunday can collection. The soup has been delivered to the food pantry.

# From the Pastor's Desk

More times than not, when I hear people talk about the season of Lent, they talk in terms of giving something up, but if we are not careful this can cause us to miss the point to the season's journey.

For me, a more helpful way to think about the season of Lent is how can I spend more time with God and with the people in my life? Once I figure out how to spend more time with God and the people in my life, that will dictate what I need to give up for the season of Lent.



I came across a quote of a favorite Christian thinker I have read for years, Douglas John Hall, which is what helped me think about this in this different way. This comes from his book, Confessing Faith. "Jesus said "Follow Me!" not "Follow a model-for-ministry that I am leaving behind for you."

It is not as if the church were a voluntary community of altruistic persons who thought it good to behave in the world as Jesus behaved; rather, it is a community gathered by the Holy Spirit and made participant in the life and work of the crucified and risen Christ. The church does not "extend" this representative life of the Christ into a world in, and to which, the Christ himself is no longer present." (DJH, Confessing Faith, Minneapolis: Augsburg Fortress, 1998; pg. 185.)

What Hall is trying to remind us of is that our faith puts us in a relationship with Jesus; where we experience this most fully is when we share ourselves as a person with other persons, stepping into the brokenness of their life as we let them step into the brokenness of our life. Jesus' work was to reconcile people which makes our work, as Christians, the same. What this looks like is walking with people and learning to love them as they are, flaws and all, and letting them, if they are able, love us with our flaws and all.

I met two people who embodied this in a similar way, a man named Gene and a woman named Geri. Both were retired and both were, later in life, diagnosed with terminal cancer. Both listened to their options and chose to do nothing treatment-wise, and both became very active in the time they had left. They each called everyone they cared about and invited them over to their house one at a time over a two-month period. One had everyone sit in the living room for a conversation and the other had everyone sit at the kitchen table with cookies and a hot beverage for a conversation.

What they both did was tell everyone how much they meant to them, what they appreciated about them, a few of their fondest memories with them, and that they loved them. They both were able to say goodbye in a meaningful way to everyone they cared about. After the last person was seen for each of them, they died within a day or week of the visit, way earlier then predicted.

The one regret both Gene and Geri had that they shared with me during my visit with them each was that they didn't do this sooner, or more often, because the time they spent with each person turned out to be an incredible blessing for them.

I believe this is what the Lenten journey is really about. We walk with the person of Jesus as we encounter Jesus in the sharing of our lives with the people God brings across our path. The sharing is not about being polite and nice but about actually caring for and bearing each other's stories and burdens so that neither of us is ever alone in our life's journey. Let us continue to walk with each other seeing each other face to face and embracing Jesus' presence in our midst as we walk together.

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
